- 5 PRESS 1 THEN 0 AT THIS TIME. WE DO NEED YOU TO PRESS 1 THEN 0
- 6 TO PLACE YOUR LINE INTO THE QUEUE. OUR FIRST SPEAKER IS DAVID
- 7 MALCOLM, PLEASE STATE YOUR AGENDA ITEMS AND IF YOU ARE
- 8 ADDRESSING ON GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT TODAY. YOU MAY BEGIN.

- 10 DAVID MALCOLM: RESOLUTION FROM SUPERVISOR HAHN. MY NAME IS
- 11 DAVID MALCCOLM, AND I'M THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF
- 12 EDUCATION FOR ROLLING UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT. ON AUGUST 10TH,
- 13 WE WILL BE GOING TO DISTANCE LEARNING THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRE
- 14 DISTRICT. THIS HAS CREATED MANY CHALLENGES TO US, BUT THE
- 15 BIGGEST CHALLENGE IS FOR OUR MCKINNEY-VENTO CHILDREN.
- 16 MCKINNEY-VENTO CHILDREN ARE WHAT'S KNOWN AS THE HOMELESS
- 17 CHILDREN. THAT DOES NOT MEAN THAT THEY ARE LIVING ON THE
- 18 STREET, BUT THIS MEANS THEY DON'T HAVE A PERMANENT ADDRESS,
- 19 EITHER HOTEL, GARAGE, ETC. IN ORDER TO GO TO DISTANCE
- 20 LEARNING, WE HANDED OUT COMPUTERS, LAPTOPS, ETC. TO ALL THE
- 21 CHILDREN. HOWEVER, YOU NEED HOT SPOT TO CONNECT WITH THE
- 22 TEACHER. THAT HOT SPOT NEEDS A PERMANENT ADDRESS. SINCE THESE
- 23 MCKINNEY-VENTO CHILDREN DO NOT HAVE A PERMANENT ADDRESS, THEY
- 24 CANNOT GET A HOT SPOT. THIS IS WHERE THE PARKS AND RECREATION
- 25 AND THE LIBRARIES COULD JOIN WITH THE SCHOOL DISTRICT AS

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- 1 PARTNERS AND PROVIDE THAT HOT SPOT IN THAT LOCATION WHERE
- 2 THESE CHILDREN CAN GO TO CONNECT WITH THEIR TEACHERS. THE
- 3 RESOLUTION FROM SUPERVISOR HAHN WILL ENABLE THE PARKS AND
- 4 RECREATION DEPARTMENT AND THE LIBRARIES TO PARTNER WITH THE
- 5 SCHOOL DISTRICT.

- 10 MODERATOR: ANTHONY DUARTE, PLEASE STATE YOUR AGENDA ITEMS AND
- 11 IF YOU ARE ALSO ADDRESSING ON GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT TODAY,
- 12 YOU MAY BEGIN.

- 14 ANTHONY DUARTE: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS ANTHONY DUARTE. I AM
- 15 THE CURRENT SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT FOR HACIENDA-LA PUENTE
- 16 UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, WHICH ENCOMPASSES MOSTLY
- 17 UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES. I AM CALLING IN SUPPORT OF ITEM
- 18 13, THE USE OF PARKS AND LIBRARIES AS ALTERNATIVE PLACES OF
- 19 LEARNING FOR 2020-2021 SCHOOL YEAR AS INTRODUCED BY SUPERVISOR
- 20 HAHN. WITH SCHOOL DISTRICTS GOING TO 100 PERCENT DISTANCE
- 21 LEARNING FOR THE FALL, WE ARE IN NEED OF CREATIVE PARTNERSHIPS
- 22 LIKE THE ONE BEING PROPOSED HERE TO MEET THE NEEDS OF OUR MOST
- 23 NEEDY STUDENTS, WHICH ARE OUR FOSTER YOUTH AND HOMELESS YOUTH
- 24 AND STUDENTS OF ESSENTIAL WORKERS. SO I AM CALLING IN TO

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- 1 SUPPORT THIS MOTION, AND I URGE THE SUPERVISORS TO VOTE FOR
- 2 IT.

4 MS. LINGAT: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER PLEASE.

- 6 MODERATOR: TAB ROADS, PLEASE STATE THE AGENDA ITEMS AND IF YOU
- 7 ARE ALSO ADDRESSING ON GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT TODAY, YOU MAY
- 8 BEGIN.

9

- 10 TAB ROADS: GOOD MORNING, REGARDING 51C AND GENERAL PUBLIC
- 11 COMMENT, MY NAME IS TAB ROADS, I AM PRESIDENT OF THE LOS
- 12 ANGELES COUNTY PROFESSIONAL PEACE OFFICERS ASSOCIATION,
- 13 REPRESENTING OVER 9,500 CURRENT AND RETIRED COUNTY EMPLOYEES.
- 14 AS MEMBERS WHO LIVE AND WORK IN THE AREA, WE ARE GRATEFUL FOR
- 15 YOUR RECOGNITION UNDERFUNDED COMMUNITY PROGRAM AND
- 16 APPRECIATIVE OF ALL EFFORTS TO IMPROVE LOS ANGELES COUNTY.
- 17 HOWEVER, P.P.O.A.'S PROFOUNDLY CONCERNED THAT THIS ISSUE IS A
- 18 PRIORITY DUE TO THIS TIME OF LIMITED ACCESS AND CONVERSATION
- 19 DUE TO THE COVID-19 CRISIS. THIS MOTION WHICH WAS JUST BROUGHT
- 20 FORWARD LAST FRIDAY WITHOUT PREVIOUS DISCUSSION REQUIRES
- 21 SERIOUS DIALOGUE AS WELL AS AN IN DEPTH ANALYSIS OF ITS
- 22 EFFECTS, LEGAL REVIEW, AND EXAMINATION OF UNANTICIPATED
- 23 OUTCOMES. WHY ARE WE ENTERTAINING SWEEPING CHANGES TO OUR
- 24 COUNTY SYSTEM WHEN WE ARE FACING YET ANOTHER POTENTIAL
- 25 LOCKDOWN OF OUR STATE AND COUNTY DUE TO THE PANDEMIC.

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- 1 (INAUDIBLE) OF THIS IS ENDEAVOR APPEARS TO BE ILL-TIMED AND
- 2 POORLY-ADVISED WHILE WE SHOULD BE FOCUSED ON PUSHING OUR
- 3 COMMUNITIES THROUGH THE EXISTING HEALTH CRISIS AND LOOMING
- 4 FINANCIAL DISASTER WHICH TO DATE HAS NOT YET BEEN QUANTIFIED.
- 5 FOR GENERAL COMMENT, ADDITIONALLY, P.P.O.A. HAS GREAT CONCERNS
- 6 FOR WHAT THE RESULT OF A BALLOT MEASURE COULD REPRESENT IN
- 7 UNINTENDED POTENTIALLY CATASTROPHIC CONSEQUENCES TO THE SAFETY
- 8 OF OUR COMMUNITIES AND COUNTY EMPLOYEES. WE CANNOT, AT THIS
- 9 TIME, SUPPORT THE IDEA OF SUCH A COMPLICATED BUDGET AND LEGAL
- 10 ISSUE, DEFERRING THE BOARD'S FIDUCIARY RESPONSIBILITY AND THE
- 11 CONTROL OF BILLIONS OF DOLLARS TO THE VOTERS, WHICH COULD
- 12 AFFECT ALL FAMILIES WITHIN THE COUNTY AND POSSIBLY THE
- 13 EMPLOYMENT STATUS OF THOUSANDS OF UNIONIZED COUNTY EMPLOYEES.
- 14 AS I DISCUSSED WITH EACH OF YOU INDIVIDUALLY, OUR MEMBERSHIP
- 15 REPRESENTS NUMEROUS CLASSIFICATIONS OF COUNTY EMPLOYEES AND
- 16 THE SUBJECT MATTER EXPERTISE TO PROVIDE INSIGHT AND

- 13 HOUSING, HEALTH, ARTS, INFRASTRUCTURE, JUSTICE, VETERAN'S
- 14 SERVICES, ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION, COMMUNITY, AND SOCIAL
- 15 SERVICES.. THIS IS BROAD. THIS IS DEEP. THIS IS SUBSTANTIVE,
- 16 AND THAT'S WHAT THIS MOMENT REQUIRES. AND I CONTINUE TO
- 17 ACKNOWLEDGE THE COUNTY'S AFFINITY ASSOCIATIONS WHICH ARE

- 3 DISPARITIES IN FAMILY STABILITY, HEALTH, MENTAL WELLNESS,
- 4 EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, PUBLIC SAFETY,
- 5 CRIMINAL JUSTICE, AND HOUSING. THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-
- 6 THOMAS, FOR THIS VERY BIG MOTION AND, FRANKLY, OVERDUE. I
- 7 THINK MANY OF US, MYSELF INCLUDED, HAVE CELEBRATED THE
- 8 PROGRESSIVE POLICIES AND REFORMS THAT THIS BOARD HAS PUT IN
- 9 PLACE, AND I BELIEVED THAT, BECAUSE THEY WERE PROGRESSIVE
- 10 POLICIES, THAT THEY WERE ENOUGH TO ADDRESS SOCIETY'S ILLS, BUT

- 15 BUT OUR OWN. IT'S TIME THAT WE LOOK AT OUR OWN INSTITUTIONS
- 16 AND EXAMINE HOW THEY HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO THE PERSISTENT
- 17 INEQUALITY AND DISCRIMINATION THAT HAS HELD BLACK L.A. COUNTY
- 18 RESIDENTS BACK AND CONTRIBUTED TO MAKING RACISM NOT JUST A
- 19 MORAL CRISIS, BUT A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS. AND I THINK WATCHING
- 20 ALL THE MEMORIES ABOUT MY FORMER COLLEAGUE, JOHN LEWIS, AS
- 21 WELL AS HILDA SOLIS'S FORMER COLLEAGUE, OVER THE WEEKEND,
- 22 WATCHING THE DOCUMENTARY ABOUT HIS LIFE, IT WAS EASY FOR US TO
- 23 SAY, WELL, THAT WASN'T US. YOU KNOW, THAT WAS THE SOUTH. AND,
- 24 EVEN THOUGH I DIDN'T GROW UP IN A LOS ANGELES THAT VISIBLY HAD
- 25 WHITES ONLY, COLORED ONLY, SIGNS, IT IS CLEAR THAT RACISM HAS

- 3 THE CITY OF THE L.A., AND THEN, OF COURSE, AS THE SECOND
- 4 DISTRICT COUNTY SUPERVISOR, HOW HE FOUGHT REGULARLY AGAINST
- 5 INSTITUTIONAL RACISM WITHIN THE CITY AND THE COUNTY, MOSTLY BY
- 6 HIS COLLEAGUES. AND HIM TELLING US, HE WAS ON THE PUBLIC WORKS
- 7 COMMITTEE IN THE CITY OF L.A., AND HE REFUSED TO APPROVE OTHER
- 8 COUNSEL MEMBER'S REQUESTS FOR NEW POOLS, NEW PARKS, NEW
- 9 LIBRARIES BECAUSE THEY NEVER WOULD APPROVE THOSE FOR HIS
- 10 DISTRICT. AND SO EVERY POOL, EVERY PARK, EVERY LIBRARY
- 11 CURRENTLY IN YOUR DISTRICT, MARK, YOU KNOW WAS HARD-FOUGHT.
- 12 AND IT WILL BE GREAT TO FINALLY BEGIN LOOKING AT THIS COUNTY-
- 13 WIDE, SO IT IS NOT JUST ONE OR TWO SUPERVISORS WHO FEEL LIKE,
- 14 IN REPRESENTING THEIR COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, THEY HAVE TO FIGHT
- 15 THE SYSTEM, BUT THAT WE, AS A WHOLE, COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES,
- 16 WILL TAKE UP THAT CAUSE WITH THEM. I THINK THIS MOTION IS FAR-
- 17 REACHING. IT DOESN'T -- INSTITUTIONAL RACISM DOESN'T START AND
- 18 END IN OUR CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT WE

- 18 YOU CAST A VOTE, YOU ARE ANSWERING THE OUESTION WHICH SIDE ARE
- 19 YOU ON. WHICH SIDE ARE YOU ON BECAUSE HISTORICALLY, ALL THE
- 20 WAY UNTIL TODAY, THERE HAS BEEN -- WE CALL IT DISCRIMINATION,

- 10 LOOK AT OUR AFRICAN-AMERICAN FAMILIES. THEY ARE STILL
- 11 SUFFERING FROM THIS SYSTEMIC AND SYSTEMATIC, KIND OF, MARCH OF
- 12 INTENTIONAL ACTIONS TO MAKE CERTAIN THAT SOMEONE IS KEPT DOWN
- 13 SO THAT SOMEONE CAN RISE. AND I THINK IN DECLARING TODAY AND
- 14 DEVOTING OURSELVES, REALLY I WOULD SAY I AM VERY MOVED BY
- 15 LOOKING AT ALL OF THE WORK THAT JOHN LEWIS DID, BUT I KNOW
- 16 THAT SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS HIMSELF, I REMEMBER MEETING HIM

- 6 COORDINATING COMMITTEE, AN ORGANIZATION THAT COORDINATED
