JUSTICE CONNECT SUPPORT CENTER


The JCOD Justice Connect Support Center at 1-833-LAC-JCOD or 1-833-522-5263 is available 7 days a week from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. for justice-involved individuals, their families, and the community. The Support Center has facilitated connections to a wide range of resources, including transportation, housing, and court reminders for more than 8,000 people who have called between Oct. 2023 to Oct. 2024.

JCOD's companion website **justiceconnect.org** is available with information about the pretrial process and links to key services and resources.



LOS ANGELES COUNTY CARECONNECT APP

In collaboration with the CEO's Chief Information Office, JCOD worked with the support of a contractor to develop LA County CareConnect, a bed and service navigation application aimed at providing care and service linkages for individuals seeking services, including justice-involved individuals. CareConnect focuses on a wide range of needs, including social services, employment, and health. The application had a soft launch in July 2024.









INDEPENDENT PRETRIAL **SERVICES AIRPORT COURTHOUSE PILOT**

JCOD designed and is implementing the Independent Pretrial Services Agency, which will deliver integrated, equitable, and culturally competent pretrial and diversion services across LA County.

On June 25, 2024, JCOD's Independent Pretrial Services Agency launched its first pretrial services pilot.

A team of navigators is serving the courthouse and is ready to assist individuals who are seeking pretrial services at Airport Courthouse.

LACTC **Fire Camp**

On January 31, 2024, JCOD launched a new job training program – Los Angeles County **Training Center** (LACTC).

The program is preparing adults (prioritizing transition-aged youth with prior justice and/or foster system involvement, and veterans) for careers in the fire service, increasing employment opportunities among typically disadvantaged populations, and helping to reduce recidivism.

YO! **Youth Overcoming!**

In January 2023, JCOD, in partnership with the LA County Probation Department, launched YO! A nine-month "transformative mentorship program" designed to serve young adults ages 18-30 who are on adult probation, with a curriculum rooted in trauma history examining the ways in which traumatic experiences are processed, with the objective to "meet young people where they are," reshape cognitive behaviors, and bolster prosocial involvement in education, work, and civic activities. To incentivize participation, each participant receives a \$100 monthly stipend upon achieving milestones.

RICMS

JCOD Reentry Intensive Case Management Services

Voluntary program where individuals can connect with Community Health Workers (CHW)/Peer Support Specialist (PSS) who have lived experience and act as case managers, peer mentors, credible messengers, and advocates.

Eligibility:

- 18 or older
- Contact with law enforcement through an arrest or incarceration
- Have mild to moderate mental health or substance use disorder (SUD)
- Client must be enrolled in the RICMS program to receive JCOD reentry interim housing services

An evaluation of the program found that



72%

of participants did not experience a rearrest or future incarceration.



Participants were also less likely to

have interactions with the criminal legal system, a new conviction, a probation revocation, or visit an emergency room than individuals from a comparison group.

Breaking Barriers

Breaking Barriers provides justice-involved individuals with housing, employment, and supportive services to enable participants to "transition in place" and take over the full rent amount after 24-months.

STOP

JCOD Specialized Treatment for Optimized Programming

JCOD STOP is a custody alternative for individuals who can serve at least 4 months in an interim housing program with services that address criminogenic factors.

Eligibility

- Minimum 4 months required in the program
- Maximum Program Time= 1 year, possible to be extended
- Individuals with mild mental illness and who are stable are eligible
- For non-English and non-Spanish speakers, eligibility is on a case-by case basis
- Any crime is eligible. To be determined on a case-by-case basis: arson, sex related offenses and those with 290 registration.





Reentry Interim Housing

Reentry Interim Housing provides programming and short-term housing for up to 9-months and support through JCOD Care Management Programs to transition to longer-term housing.


Residential programming includes, life skills, health and wellness, financial literacy, and money management.



Individuals can be referred to Emergency Housing through the Justice Connect Support Center or the Pretrial Court-based Navigators.

Emergency Housing

Emergency Housing provides food and a safe, low-barrier, and supportive 24-hour temporary shelter to justice-involved individuals exiting from incarceration or who are unhoused. The goal is to stabilize and heal for up to 4 weeks while locating longer-term housing solutions through JCOD care management programs.

Offers low barrier supportive services including, housing, substance use linkage, employment support, legal assistance, education and social skills training, family reunification, community outreach, Innovative Employment Solutions (INVEST), mental health and benefits linkage, and access to a computer lab. Health and healing through the arts are also offered.




WEBSITE RELAUNCH


